STATEMENT FROM THE UNITED STATES CONFERENCE OF CATHOLIC BISHOPS ON IMMIGRATION





As pastors, we the bishops of the United States are bound to our people by ties of communion and compassion in Our Lord Jesus Christ. We are disturbed when we see among our people a climate of fear and anxiety around questions of profiling and immigration enforcement. We are saddened by the state of contemporary debate and the vilification of immigrants. We are concerned about the conditions in detention centers and the lack of access to pastoral care. We lament that some immigrants in the United States have arbitrarily lost their legal status. We are troubled by threats against the sanctity of houses of worship and the special nature of hospitals and schools. We are grieved when we meet parents who fear being detained when taking their children to school and when we try to console family members who have already been separated from their loved ones.

Despite obstacles and prejudices, generations of immigrants have made enormous contributions to the well-being of our nation. We as Catholic bishops love our country and pray for its peace and prosperity. For this very reason, we feel compelled now in this environment to raise our voices in defense of God-given human dignity.

Catholic teaching exhorts nations to recognize the fundamental dignity of all persons, including immigrants. We bishops advocate for a meaningful reform of our nation's immigration laws and procedures. Human dignity and national security are not in conflict. Both are possible if people of good will work together.

We recognize that nations have a responsibility to regulate their borders and establish a just and orderly immigration system for the sake of the common good. Without such processes, immigrants face the risk of trafficking and other forms of exploitation. Safe and legal pathways serve as an antidote to such risks. The Church's teaching rests on the foundational concern for the human person, as created in the image and likeness of God (Genesis 1:27). As pastors, we look to Sacred Scripture and the example of the Lord Himself, where we find the wisdom of God's compassion. The priority of the Lord, as the Prophets remind us, is for those who are most vulnerable: the widow, the orphan, the poor, and the stranger (Zechariah 7:10). In the Lord Jesus, we see the One who became poor for our sake (2 Corinthians 8:9), we see the Good Samaritan who lifts us from the dust (Luke 10:30–37), and we see the One who is found in the least of these (Matthew 25). The Church's concern for neighbor and our concern here for immigrants is a response to the Lord's command to love as He has loved us (John 13:34).

To our immigrant brothers and sisters, we stand with you in your suffering, since, when one member suffers, all suffer (cf. 1 Corinthians 12:26). You are not alone!

We note with gratitude that so many of our clergy, consecrated religious, and lay faithful already accompany and assist immigrants in meeting their basic human needs. We urge all people of good will to continue and expand such efforts.

We oppose the indiscriminate mass deportation of people. We pray for an end to dehumanizing rhetoric and violence, whether directed at immigrants or at law enforcement. We pray that the Lord may guide the leaders of our nation, and we are grateful for past and present opportunities to dialogue with public and elected officials. In this dialogue, we will continue to advocate for meaningful immigration reform.

As disciples of the Lord, we remain men and women of hope, and hope does not disappoint! (cf. Romans 5:5)

May the mantle of Our Lady of Guadalupe enfold us all in her maternal and loving care and draw us ever closer to the heart of Christ.

Basics of Catholicism part 113

All-male Priesthood

Often when we ponder the ruling that only men can be priests, we focus only on Jesus and assume that we know what he wants and what he is doing. In order for us to appreciate the larger context of this desire of Jesus, we need to expand our thinking into the larger context of Christianity, the Old Testament.

As almost everyone knows, the priests of the Old Testament were only male. The Books of Law do not allow women to become priests. The most common argument for this restriction is the patriarchal nature of that time. Yet, if we take a moment to wander through the Old Testament, the role of men and women get blurred. Women could be judges and prophets. We have several examples throughout the Book of Judges and into the historical books of women taking on a prominent roles in Israel. The Judge Deborah counseled the leaders of Israel and brought them back to the right worship of God. The prophetess Judith, from the Book of Judith, commanded the leaders of the army to come to her for counsel. Some of the queens of Israel had greater power than their husbands. The traditions of Judaism were passed down from the mothers not the fathers. No role for women was greater than the Queen Mother. The mother of the king held a role unparalleled in Israelite society. She could influence the decisions of the king and it was understood that he would obey her requests. Women played an incredibly important role in the functioning of Jewish society and were allowed to hold places of honor and importance in society.

With all these roles and places of prominence for women, Jewish law still forbade women from entering the priesthood and we have no evidence of women priests on any level. This short purview into Jewish society is valuable for us. God established the laws for Israel and he established them as perpetual laws. Jesus, who is God, if he overturned or changed these laws, then everyone would understand him to be false. God's laws do not change. Therefore, we should understand and expect that the laws governing priesthood of the Old Testament would carry forward into the New Testament.

To further emphasize my point, Jesus' "rite" for ordaining his priests – the washing of the feet and the Last Supper – mirrors the ordination rite of the Old Testament. They would start by washing their feet (and their entire bodies but mainly the feet), they would then be clothed in new garments (the blood of Jesus), and then be fed a meal of the sacrificed animal (the eating of the Last Supper and the Body and Blood of Jesus). Clearly Jesus is showing a continuation between the priesthood of the Old Covenant and the priesthood of the New Covenant. We simply have so many examples of Jesus' desire to continue the laws of the Old Testament and continue the all-male priesthood that we simply cannot change this ruling. Yet, now we have a more exciting task before us: why did Jesus choose an all-male priesthood?




