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Basics of Catholicism part 84

Satisfaction

The second part of satisfaction is the feeling of being forgiven. I spent the last session focusing on the penance, the first part of satisfaction. Now I want to spend this session focusing on the second part. What do we mean by the feeling of being forgiven? A common experience in the Sacrament of Reconciliation, and apt analogy, is that our experience of this Sacrament is compared to washing our laundry or cleaning our car. Every so often, we take time to wash all our dirty clothes and, once they are clean, we are ready for life again. Therefore, the Sacrament of Reconciliation becomes a dumping ground for all our sins and, once they are confessed, we are ready to start life anew. Notice several issues with this experience of the Sacrament. First, this expression of the Sacrament has no relation to God. We are not concerned about our relationship with God neither the process through which he brought us salvation. Second, is there really contrition in the person? If all we do is dump our sins on God and move on, are we really sorry? Are we asking for grace and healing? Do we want to overcome our sins and live in the freedom God wishes to give us? Lastly, what does this say about ourselves? We simply want to be free from sin so that we don't have to feel its effects and the burden of its weight. God or the hope for heaven is of little importance.

Satisfaction brings all of these key elements of the Sacrament of Reconciliation together. First, the Sacrament is about our relationship with God and bringing ourselves before him. This action alone can bring immense healing. We allow ourselves to be vulnerable to God and invite him into our lives. By allowing ourselves this vulnerability, we realize that we have nothing to fear before God. He is a merciful judge. He is the one who loves us. He is the one who seeks our healing and gives us the freedom to come before him with any sin without condemnation. The greatest spiritual challenge that many people feel today is a fear of God condemning them.

The second key element to satisfaction is the feeling of being forgiven. Not everyone has this experience once they leave the confessional. Most people feel it occasionally. Feeling forgiven can be a knowledge of forgiveness. Regardless of the feelings, one of the key elements of this Sacrament is the reality that we have been forgiven. Nothing is more defeating to a confessor than a person who leaves but doesn't feel forgiven. The Sacrament didn't affect this person. Although we may not have a feeling, even knowing that we are forgiven and God has freed us from sin should lead us to thankfulness, joy, peace, and hope. The goal of the Sacrament is to instill in the person the hope of God's mercy, the hope of eternal life, and the hope of not sinning again.

The final aspect of satisfaction is the desire to not sin again. We should leave the confession with the hope that those sins are gone and we will not do them again. God didn't come just so that he could be our washing machine and we feel cleansed. He came that we might overcome sin and its temptations by the power of his grace. Each time a person comes to confession and receives absolution for their sins, the temptation, the allure, the power of sin diminished in that person. Each time they are more likely not to commit that sin again. This too is the feeling of satisfaction. I am freed from that sin and can live anew as God's child with the hope of one day being truly free from sin.






CALLED TO SHARE BREAD FOR LIFE


