

STATEMENT FROM THE UNITED STATES CONFERENCE OF CATHOLIC BISHOPS ON IMMIGRATION





As pastors, we the bishops of the United States are bound to our people by ties of communion and compassion in Our Lord Jesus Christ. We are disturbed when we see among our people a climate of fear and anxiety around questions of profiling and immigration enforcement. We are saddened by the state of contemporary debate and the vilification of immigrants. We are concerned about the conditions in detention centers and the lack of access to pastoral care. We lament that some immigrants in the United States have arbitrarily lost their legal status. We are troubled by threats against the sanctity of houses of worship and the special nature of hospitals and schools. We are grieved when we meet parents who fear being detained when taking their children to school and when we try to console family members who have already been separated from their loved ones.

Despite obstacles and prejudices, generations of immigrants have made enormous contributions to the well-being of our nation. We as Catholic bishops love our country and pray for its peace and prosperity. For this very reason, we feel compelled now in this environment to raise our voices in defense of God-given human dignity.

Catholic teaching exhorts nations to recognize the fundamental dignity of all persons, including immigrants. We bishops advocate for a meaningful reform of our nation's immigration laws and procedures. Human dignity and national security are not in conflict. Both are possible if people of good will work together.

We recognize that nations have a responsibility to regulate their borders and establish a just and orderly immigration system for the sake of the common good. Without such processes, immigrants face the risk of trafficking and other forms of exploitation. Safe and legal pathways serve as an antidote to such risks. The Church's teaching rests on the foundational concern for the human person, as created in the image and likeness of God (Genesis 1:27). As pastors, we look to Sacred Scripture and the example of the Lord Himself, where we find the wisdom of God's compassion. The priority of the Lord, as the Prophets remind us, is for those who are most vulnerable: the widow, the orphan, the poor, and the stranger (Zechariah 7:10). In the Lord Jesus, we see the One who became poor for our sake (2 Corinthians 8:9), we see the Good Samaritan who lifts us from the dust (Luke 10:30–37), and we see the One who is found in the least of these (Matthew 25). The Church's concern for neighbor and our concern here for immigrants is a response to the Lord's command to love as He has loved us (John 13:34).

To our immigrant brothers and sisters, we stand with you in your suffering, since, when one member suffers, all suffer (cf. 1 Corinthians 12:26). You are not alone!

We note with gratitude that so many of our clergy, consecrated religious, and lay faithful already accompany and assist immigrants in meeting their basic human needs. We urge all people of good will to continue and expand such efforts.

We oppose the indiscriminate mass deportation of people. We pray for an end to dehumanizing rhetoric and violence, whether directed at immigrants or at law enforcement. We pray that the Lord may guide the leaders of our nation, and we are grateful for past and present opportunities to dialogue with public and elected officials. In this dialogue, we will continue to advocate for meaningful immigration reform.

As disciples of the Lord, we remain men and women of hope, and hope does not disappoint! (cf. Romans 5:5)

May the mantle of Our Lady of Guadalupe enfold us all in her maternal and loving care and draw us ever closer to the heart of Christ.

Basics of Catholicism part 112

All Male Priesthood

In the last part of this series, I indicated the strangeness that Jesus chose only men as Apostles, celebrated the Last Supper with only his disciples, and upon returning gave authority in the Church to only these 11 men. In this section I want to expand upon the strangeness and value of these moments in the lives of the disciples and the Church.

When people get frustrated with the Church over her teachings and declarations, usually the principal reason for the frustration is a desire for change. Since the dawn of Christianity, the Church had held firm on one principal value: our goal is to continue the desires of Jesus. The Church doesn't exist to help the people of the world to endure life or to make the world a better place. The Church doesn't exist to bring people together and to give them hope. The Church exists for only one purpose: to proclaim the passion, death, and Resurrection of Jesus with the hope that faithfulness to the mission of Jesus will bring people to salvation. For this reason, the Church maintains the importance of always doing as Jesus would want and to continually discern the will of God at each point in church history for the sake of continuing this proclamation. Whenever we struggle with a teaching or are in need of renewal or updates, we always go back to Scripture and the Tradition to understand the will of God for the Church.

The main struggle with the restriction of only men becoming deacons, priests, and bishops is that the Church doesn't have the authority to change this teaching. Since the time of Jesus, he only ordained men to be priests. The early Church, who is the best example of the continuation of the life and ministry of Jesus, could have changed this teaching or understood Jesus' actions in a different way but didn't. In the life of the early church, women held prominent places in the church including caring for churches and having forms of leadership but were never priests. Some of the most important martyrs of the early church were women but they too were not priests. We have no examples from the early church to suggest that Jesus desired his church to have anything but an all-male priesthood.

As we continue to examine the issue of an all-male priesthood, we also have to ponder some very valuable questions. Why did Jesus only want men to be priests? How does the maleness of the priesthood teach us about God's desire for his Church? What are the roles for men and women in the Church? What is the nature of the priest? Our goal is always to do the will of Jesus. If we continue to ponder his teachings and examples, then we come to a place where we can appreciate the wisdom of God. Otherwise, we continue to be upset that God has not matched our desires and conformed to our will.




Congratulations!




