### Basics of Catholicism part 35

The Easter Vigil

The Easter Vigil is the final Mass of the Sacred Triduum and the highest Mass of the year. This normally 2-hour Mass, chronicles the major events of salvation history and explains the plan for Jesus to rise from the dead. Each part of this Mass directly relates to understanding Jesus' role in our salvation and experiencing the power and joy of Easter.

This Mass begins in a way unlike any other Mass. The rules of the Easter Vigil state that the Mass must begin 1 hour after sunset. Beginning the Mass this late gives the sense of the night vigil awaiting Jesus' rise from the tomb. In a similar way it gives the Mass a somber and anticipatory feeling. The first part of the Easter Vigil begins outside with the Easter fire. This fire represents the anticipation of waiting for the dawn, reminds us of Peter sitting around the fire, and the joy of light and heat, two symbols of the Resurrection. Around the fire, the people gather for the blessing of the Paschal Candle. This candle represents Jesus in many ways. During the blessing, the priest cuts into the candle the various symbols that mark this candle as a representation of Jesus. The Alpha and Omega, the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet, remind us that Jesus is the beginning and the end, the one who existed before all things and will exist after all things. The year is marked into the candle to show the value of each year and the joy of reliving the Paschal Mysteries each year. Then five pins are put into the cross to mark the five wounds of Jesus. After the candle has been blessed, the priest uses the Easter fire to light the candle and then processes into the church. With the people following behind the priest and then filling into the dark church, the Easter Candle is ceremoniously brought into the church while each person lights their candles from the Paschal Candle. The lighting of the candles fills the darkened space with light bringing light to our darkness. Once the candle reaches the altar, the priest places the candle in its holder and sings the Exultet. The Exultet is a long song that explains the importance of the candle and the importance of Jesus rising from the dead. This one song summarizes all the Easter mysteries.

Following from the Exultet and the procession with the candle, the Liturgy of the Word begins. Unlike all other Masses, this Liturgy of the Word contains 9 readings, 7 psalms, and 8 prayers. Each reading chronicles salvation history and explains the Jesus had to come to be with us and rise from the dead. The first seven readings follow the same format: reading, psalm, and prayer. After the 7<sup>th</sup> reading, we triumphally sing the Gloria, which has now returned after our 40-day fast from it. As the Gloria is sung, the lights of the church come on and all the candles are lit. This hymn of joy is heightened by the light and the candles. The Church has been renewed after the 40-day fast and the darkness of Jesus' death on the Cross. After the Gloria, we read from the New Testament to connect the 7 Old Testament readings to the New Testament. Then the Alleluia is sung for the first time since before Lent. We triumphally sing this Alleluia by extending its length and repeating it three times. The Mass proceeds with the proclamation of the Gospel and the homily.
