Basics of Catholicism part 3

Who is God?

Proofs for the Existence of God

The Ontological Proof

God is that than which nothing greater can be conceived.

Although the language of this proof seems complicated, an example will show the simplicity of this proof. Imagine a perfect island. What is on your perfect island? Does it have trees, beaches, birds? Regardless of the qualities of this perfect island, the grandeur of God will always be greater than this island. Even if we could imagine the majesty and greatness of God, he will always be greater than anything we could possibly imagine. The problem with this proof is it makes God feel distant, incomprehensible, and foreign. How do we have a relationship with a God that we can't even mentally grasp. Although the ontological proof is true that God is greater than anything we could possibly conceive of, this is not the fullness of who God is. The last part of this proof that is often overlooked is the limitation of the island. Although we can create a mental image of the perfect island, it has one major limitation: it doesn't exist. God does exist which makes him even greater than the most perfect thing we could imagine.

The first cause

Everything in our universe is proceeded by something else. If some bowling pins are knocked over, they are caused by the bowling ball hitting them. The bowling ball hit them because I rolled the ball down the alley. I came to the alley because someone built the alley. The alley was built because someone had the money to buy the alley. And so on back to some first thing that caused everything. Some argue that these causal relationships can go back infinitely. This is not true. Only one thing is infinite: God. Everything else is finite, structured by time, bounded by space, and effected by other things. Therefore we have no reason to believe that anything, besides God, in our university is infinite neither is there any infinite series of causes. All things in the universe originate from a singular cause, God creating it. From there the causal relationships begin.

Defending the first cause argument is more difficult than some may realize. Many people argue for a infinite number of causes thus eliminating God's first cause and God altogether. Several problems exist with the infinite cause argument. First, nothing in our universe is infinite. Even the universe itself has a limit caused by the expansion of space-time from the Big Bang. Second, the infinite cause argument only works if there is only one cause and the entire universe is static, eternal. As long as something causes something else to happen, the presence of the first cause requires a series of causes. Lastly, something cannot be caused by nothing. In other words, things don't start moving without something moving them. Nothing happens without something causing it to happen. If our world was the opposite, then random things would be continually happening with nothing to cause them to happen. This doesn't happen. Everything that happens can be linked to a cause.


