Sexual Ethics

Homosexuality

The Church's teaching on homosexuality seems to cause confusion amongst both the faithful and the people of the world. In this first part I will explore the teaching of the Church related to homosexuality as explained in the Catechism. In the next part I will explain some of the common misconceptions and challenges to the Church's teaching.

The Church's teaching on homosexuality is summarized in three paragraphs (2357-2359). The Church makes a strong distinction between homosexual acts and same-sex attraction. Same-sex attraction is the feeling of sexual attraction to a person of the same gender. Although our society merges the attraction with the acts, the Church keeps them separate. The Catechism states the origins of same-sex attraction are unknown yet contrary to the natural law. The natural order is that all animals are attracted to those of the opposite sex for the purpose of procreation. Therefore same-sex attraction is unnatural. Even though same-sex attraction is considered unnatural, it is not sinful. A sinful behavior requires the person to make a choice and to perform an action. Same-sex attraction is neither a choice nor an action and therefore is not sinful. Homosexual acts, in contrast, are considered sinful. Sexual acts are limited to the context of marriage. Since homosexual acts cannot be performed in the context of marriage, they are sinful.

With this distinction in mind, the Catechism continues to explain not just the moral nature of homosexuality but also our response as people of faith. With this unnatural desire placed upon them, the Church recognizes the challenges these people face and requires us to respond with charity and love. The trials these people face in being understood by society and the people of the Church, their own conflict between their natural desires, and the requisite call to celibacy, must be responded to with "respect, compassion, and sensitivity." No unjust discrimination should be shown to them. Hence Pope Francis' latest statement that criminalizing homosexuality is a sin. The Church is called to walk with people in their struggles and those facing same-sex attraction are not excluded. Instead, the call of the Church is to help them live the call to celibacy and self-mastery so that they may enjoy interior freedom.
