Basics of Catholicism part 34

The Sacred Triduum

I know that by now the Triduum has passed and Easter has begun. Nevertheless, knowing where we have been and how those events factor into the Easter Season is valuable if not for this year, then next year.

Last time we covered the Mass of the Lord's Supper celebrated on Holy Thursday. That Mass set the tone for the next two parts of that Mass: the Liturgy of the Lord's Passion and the Easter Vigil.

The Liturgy of the Lord's Passion celebrated on Good Friday is one of the most unique liturgies of the year. Not only is it not a Mass with no Eucharistic prayer but we venerate the Cross, have an extended form of the General Intercessions, and the liturgy begins and ends in silence. Having left the church the night before in complete silence with the Blessed Sacrament removed from the church, we begin this liturgy with the Blessed Sacrament remaining removed and silence marking its beginning. The priest processes forward like normal but in silence. He lays prostrate on the floor in silence with everyone kneeling. Once he rises, he prays the opening prayer and the liturgy has begun. With a few exceptions, everything proceeds like normal. We, however, read the entire Passion account from John's Gospel and always John's Gospel. The triumphal tone of his Gospel gives a different vibe from Passion Sunday in that Jesus wanted to go to the Cross and his death was a triumph. Following the reading of the Passion, we start the Solemn Intercessions. The intercession we use for the Mass are normally short prayers with the response "Lord hear our prayer." The Solemn Intercession of Good Friday are quite long. Each prayer has a part by the reader and a prayer by the priest. These 12 intercessions were added by the reforms under Pope Pius XII to mark the most essential things were need to pray for during this sacred time.


The most prominent parts of the Good Friday liturgy complete the liturgy. Following the intercessions, the cross is brought forward. The cross can be either solemnly brought into the church or unveiled at the foot of the altar. This moment remembers and recognizes the solemnity of the day as the day that Jesus died. The priest venerates the cross with shoes removed and then invites everyone else to do the same. Some priests change the sequence of the events so that Communion comes first and then veneration. The proper sequence of events shows to the people that the one we venerate is the one we eat. How can we consume the Body and Blood of Jesus if he had not died? How can we understand the profoundness of our sacred meal if we did not first adore the one who made it possible? We venerate the Body of Jesus as it hung on the cross then we consume him. Thus, the final part of the Good Friday liturgy is Communion. This is Communion without the Eucharistic Prayer. After the Mass of the Lord's Supper, the altar is stripped. Now we set up the altar only for Communion. We simply begin with the Our Father and end with Communion. After the Solemn Blessing everyone leaves in silence with the cross remaining exposed in the center of the church. This is the only day of the year when we genuflect to the Crucifix.


