Did You Know!

Since the 12th century the Church has used the image of the pelican to depict Jesus. For centuries people noticed that when a parent pelican is starving and need to feed their young, the parents feed them with a red substance that looks like blood. They thought that the pelican pecked its breast until it bled and then fed their young with their blood. Turns out that when the chicks are hungry, they peck at their mother's chest to get to the fish. The imagery is still beautiful even if inaccurate: the mother feeding her chicks with her own blood is like Christ feeding us with his own blood.



Basics of Catholicism part 7

Attributes of God

All-knowing

The attribute of God that often gets the most attention is God as allknowing. As the attribute implies, God knows everything. Does this mean that God knows everything that we are going to do? Yes. Does that mean that we have no free-will or choice? No. I get that this may seem strange and complicated. The reason why I can answer yes that God knows everything and still affirm that we have free-choice is because of the challenge with temporality. We exist in time. As temporal beings our lives are directed by time. I know what actions I have done but not which actions I am going to do. God knows all of our actions - past, present, and future - as one event. Imagine that you are watching a movie. Instead of seeing each consecutive scene as independent images that build upon each other to make the movie, we see all the individual images as one image superimposed over each other. Now we have one image that is all of the scenes of the movie combined into one. Looking into this image we would see the beginning, middle and end of the movie as one. We would be watching the beginning as the movie concludes. This begins to describe how God being in eternity knows all things as past, present, and future. Another way to describe this idea is that God knows our past as the tendencies we have to make certain decisions, he also sees our present where we make the decision, he also sees our future when we have made the decision, yet each of these are independent and connected. Although we like to simplify this concept and say that God's knows everything, which he does, the implications for our lives makes this attribute quite confusing.

All-powerful

We often say that God can do anything, He can move the sun and the stars at his will. He can create something new should he want to. We want to say that everything is within God's power. A few exceptions exist. Since God has to be both all-powerful, all-good, and without change, he cannot do something that would contradict himself. For instance, can God make a boulder so heavy that he cannot lift it? The question is stupid. How can God do something that he cannot do? It's a contradiction. This action is impossible. The same thing applies to Scripture and theology. God cannot make commandments for the Israelites and then a different set of commands that contradict them for the Christians. If God makes laws, they are eternal laws. So although we say that God is all-powerful, it comes with a few exceptions that make him truly powerful. These restrictions make God even more powerful because he obeys his own rules and creates laws that persist for eternity.

We have raised \$23,437 towards the Catholic Extension matching grant. We have four more months to raise an additional \$36,563. 
