Did You Know!

Although our Paschal Candle is usually hidden in the back corner, this candle is one of the great symbols of Easter. The light of the candle that illumines the darkness reminds that Jesus' Resurrection cast out the darkness of this world. The Paschal Candle is blessed during, and only during, the Easter Vigil. The blessing involves several steps. The first step is to mark the candle with the five wounds of Jesus corresponding to the five points of the cross (one being in the middle), then the alpha (Greek letter A), the omega (the Greek letter W or the last letter), and the year the candle is blessed. All of these are symbols of

Christ. The five points – five wounds on the Cross, the A and W – the beginning and the end, the year reminds us that God comes in time at this specific moment of time. The candle is then lit with the Easter Fire and solemnly processed in to illumine the dark church. The candle is blessed during the baptismal rite when it is dunked in the Baptismal font three times to symbol new life coming from the font and the breaking of the seal on the font. The Paschal Candle is used during the Easter Season, for baptisms, and for funerals. All moments that recall the Resurrection.

Affirmative Action

Over the last 10 years the status quo of affirmative action has been challenged by several schools in several states. The original intention behind affirmative action was to overcome the economic and social challenges that prevent those in minority groups from entering college. Throughout the last century, immigration followed by effects from camps and slavery led many in minority groups to lack the educational credentials and financial support to enter college. Therefore, affirmative action attempted to correct the low numbers of minorities entering the more education-based fields by lowering the entrance standards for these minority groups and giving them financial incentives.

For years this program increased the number of minorities entering higher education and the number of minorities entering the education-based job market. In the last 10 years, however, the affirmative action program has come under numerous challenges for several reasons. The most recent, and notable one, came from Harvard University and the University of North Carolina where they implemented a negative score adjustment for Asians. Asians have been outperforming every other racial group for decades and entering universities at much higher number. These universities decided to attach a negative modifier to Asian applicants to the scores across the entrance requirements. This led to a huge debate that went before the Supreme Court.

The Catholic Church is clear on the issue of race: no person or groups of people should face discrimination that causes them to seem less than human. All people should be treated with the same dignity, respect, and equality. Therefore affirmative action would violate the Church's stance on the dignity of human beings by assuming that certain races of people are not as qualified as others and therefore need extra assistance. The more ethical approach to this issue would be to address the individual needs of a specific person and look at their credentials as well as their life as a way of promoting the good of anyone in a lower economic class or who faced challenges in their upbringing. Ideally we would find a way to encourage the good of all individuals and find ways to encourage those who are disadvantaged to rise from their challenges. Choosing the qualifier of race is racism. Therefore affirmative action is immoral.

We are looking for a new co-'NV ordinator for our Food Bank. Doris Mingay has chosen to step down and we thank her for her service to the Food





FUNDING THE MINISTRY OF THE DIOCESE OF HELENA


