



Basics of Catholicism part 36

Easter Vigil

Following from the proclamation of the Gospel and the homily, the priest, with the servers and those who will be baptized, go back to the Baptismal Font. The next part of the Mass is called the Baptismal Rite. This part of the Mass should never be omitted even if we have no one to baptize. The standard time for baptizing adults is during the Mass of the Easter Vigil. Although adults can be baptized throughout the year, the expectation is for the baptisms to be during this Mass. The Baptismal Rite begins with the blessing of the new water. This water is blessed with a long invocation that shows the power of water, the profound moments when God used water to show our salvation, and the necessity of water for Baptism. Part of the rite includes the dunking of the Paschal Candle into the water. The font symbolizes the womb and the dunking of the candle indicates Jesus' action in opening the womb so that new life may come from the font. The words clarify this image. The priest asks God to unseal the font of baptism that new life may emerge from it. If adults are baptized, their baptism happens next. Then everyone is sprinkled with holy water as a sign of their baptism. If adults were baptized, then they are Confirmed next. After the Confirmations, the Mass continues as normal with the offertory.

From the Easter Vigil until Divine Mercy Sunday, the words of Eucharistic Prayer I changes. At the first part when we invoke the names of the Saint, we recall the wonderous day of Jesus' Resurrection and the prayer changes to remind us of Jesus' Resurrection. The second time it changes is more important for the baptismal rite of the Mass. Just before the consecration, the prayer changes to remind us of those who were Baptized and Confirmed during the Easter Season. We take a moment to pray for them and remind ourselves of the joy of having new members in the church. These parts only change for the nine days between the Easter Vigil and the Second Sunday of Easter, aka Divine Mercy Sunday.

The final part of the Mass that changes only changes for 10 days of the year: the sung dismissal. Technically the priest could choose to sing the dismissal after every Mass. The Easter dismissal is different from the other forms of the dismissal used throughout the year. Normally we hear something like "Go in peace" or "The Mass is ended, go in peace." For Easter we add "Go in peace, Alleluia, Alleluia" with the response "thanks be to God Alleluia, Alleluia." This special ending can only be sung from the Easter Vigil to the Divine Mercy Sunday and then on Pentecost. I know that a lot of people struggle to sing it. Yet, this song brings great joy and emphasizes the joy of praising God, of Easter, and the salvation that Jesus brought for us.


Congratulations to Harry Neal for receiving 1st Communion!
