Do you know the difference between a bishop, an archbishop, a cardinal, and the pope. A bishop and archbishop are almost the same. A bishop lead a diocese where as an archbishop leads an archdiocese. The difference between an archdiocese and a diocese are population and prestige. Archdiocese tend to be historically significant or the first diocese in a region. Cardinals are advisors to the Pope. Cardinals can be bishops, archbishops, priests, laymen, and laywomen. The church still allows for a woman to be a cardinal. Only cardinal bishops who are under 80 years old can enter conclave and be elected pope. The Pope is the bishop of Rome and the highest authority of the temporal Catholic church. He acts as Christ's delegate to lead the Church.



Social Ethics

Education part 1

When most people think of education, their first thoughts are either the primary school system or the universities. Formalized education is both valuable and necessary for the good of society but also for the flourishing of each person. When the Catholic Church teaches on education, however, education is not limited to a formalized system but is a way of life. In this first part of the series on education, I want to explore the social good that comes through both formalized and individual education before I expand upon both those types of education.

Often we limit the good of education to either a profession or to a mode of learning. Education becomes a system through which we learn basic academic skills with the hopes of applying them to various areas of our lives. For example most people do not use algebra on a normal basis nor do they find use for it in their daily lives. Yet, algebra teaches critical thinking, reasoning, and problem-solving skills. Even though the forms and details of algebra are generally not used by most people, the skills learned through studying algebra are.

This idea of education as broader than specific skills directly taught in a class is the basic of the social good of education. Education offers all individuals the chance to think critically about their lives and the world around them, teaches skills for addressing ideas and helping the individual to express themselves, guides us to explore the world and the ways we live in the world, and teaches us basic social skills that apply in various parts of life. The ideal of education is to help the individual to use well their minds and their faculties of reason in their lives. The true good of education is not simply to memorize facts or regurgitate information but to apply and to think. A flourishing human being is able to use their faculties of reason learned through education to live well. The ability to reason through problems, come up with good solutions, and to know when thoughts or ideas are wrong are not only the basis of prudential thinking but also the foundation of a well-formed conscience. God gave us both the faculty of reason as well as a conscience with the expectation that we use it. Education is necessary so that we can use well God's gifts to us.

On a side note, many argue that the Catholic Church throughout history has con-

demned critical thinking and suppresses dissident thoughts. Although parts of this are true, the church takes each dissident viewpoint and addresses it through critical thinking. Accepting all viewpoints would degrade the idea of truth and cause the good that education gives us to vanish. The Church teaches that certain teachings are correct and therefore should be accepted whereas others are wrong and should be rejected. This process is the way we determine right from wrong and truth from lies.






