

Basics of Catholicism part 19

Who is Jesus?

The next few controversies that the Church wrestled with can be complicated if not confusing. Instead of explaining the theology behind them, I am going to use the biblical examples that led to their declaration. Following from the conclusion from the Council of Nicaea that Jesus is 100% human and 100% divine, the Church wrestled with Jesus' human and divine will and with his mode of operation, i.e. whether he acts human or divine.

Some claimed that Jesus was fully human and fully divine but only visibly. His mind and soul were really divine and he functioned or operated as God not as human. Many examples throughout Scripture attest to Jesus' humanity **and** his divinity. When Jesus was on the boat with his disciples during the storm, he fell asleep. When Lazarus died, Jesus wept. When he was tired from the long day, he was hungry and thirsty. All of these examples attest to Jesus' humanity. In the same way, his desire for his father, his ability to perform miracles, his knowledge about the things of God attest to his divinity. From these examples of Jesus' life, we already see the complementarity and union of the divinity and humanity in Jesus. They are not mixed in some weird demi-god but instead discrete and separate yet also united.

The second one is complicated. Did Jesus will or have the power of choose anything but that from the desires of his divine will? Did he will as a human, as God, or as both? St. Maximus the Confessor settled this debate through his reflection on Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane. While Jesus was at prayer with his disciples before his crucifixion, he was struggling between his human and divine will. His human will, naturally, wants to live, not suffer, and be shielded from pain. His divine will wants the salvation of the world and the will of his Father to come to completion. As he wrestles with these two wills that are at odds with each other, we see that Jesus has a full human will and a full divine will which are brought into conformity through his prayer. Jesus has a divine and human will which are separate but united in him. He doesn't have some strange mix between the two but two separate wills that work together in Jesus to make the will of his Father done.

If you took a moment to think about these theological points, I think you would realize that they make sense. If Jesus is 100 % human and 100 % divine, we should expect him to have a human and divine will and mind. In order to be human, we must think and will as a human. In order to be divine, he must think and will as a God.



The exception for December is Christmas. On a similar note, with Christmas in the future, everyone is required to attend a Mass for the 4th Sunday of Advent and one Mass for Christmas. The schedule for the Christmas Season will be out next weekend.
