

Basics of Catholicism part 99

The Rite of Ordination of a Deacon

Following the promises, the rite takes a more spiritual turn. The deacon candidate, the one who is about to be ordained a deacon, lays prostrate on the floor. This gesture is one of supplication. As he lays on the floor of the cathedral, the people sing the Litany of the Saints. Think about what this moment represents. This man is laying down his life for service to the church and the people of the church. Yet, this is not some simple gesture. As we reflect on this moment, we are also calling upon the Saints of the Church to pray for this man and help him in his new role of service to the Church. The same gesture is used in the consecration of a religious. In the Benedictine tradition, the man is covered with the cuculla. It's kind of like an outer coat. This coat symbolizes death to self, it's worn for special occasions and he is buried in it. Nevertheless, this moment in both religious professions and ordinations symbolize death to self.

Once the Litany of the Saints concludes, the man rises from the floor and the Ordination Rite continues with the Prayer of Ordination. The bishop comes and lays his hands on the man's head. This gesture is one of the oldest in the church. Going back to the Old Testament times, the laying on of hands was used to anoint kings, prophets, and priests. We continue the tradition today. Now it symbolizes connection with the apostolic line. As the apostles ordained priests and deacons, so too do we carry on that lineage connecting the newly ordained man to the apostles. During this moment, the bishop says the prayer of ordination. The prayer recalls the moment the apostles chose the first deacons, the ministry and purpose of deacons, and asks for God's help for the newly ordained to fulfill this role. At this moment, the man is now a deacon. His soul is configured to Christ and he is officially a deacon.

After the bishop has concluded the Prayer of Ordination, the rest of the deacons (sometimes priests included) all process forward to lay hands on the newly ordained deacon. This moment shows the connection between the newly ordained deacon and the order of deacons; he is part of a brotherhood of deacons.

The next part of the rites continues with the symbols of the newly ordinated man and his role as a deacon. Next the deacon is vested in the vestments of a deacon. The two primary vestments are the stole and the dalmatic. The stole is a sign of authority, ministry, and role. Deacons always wear their stoles from the shoulder to the hip. This allows their arms to be free to assist the priest in his role. The dalmatic looks very similar to the priestly garb called the chasuble. Although it has several main differences. The dalmatic has sleeves allowing for greater freedom of movement of the arms. Similarly, it usually has two stripes down the front whereas a chasuble has one. Lastly, it is clasped on the side causing it to look more like a tunic whereas the chasuble is open on the side. The deacon is always vested by either another deacon or a priest. You are not allowed to vest yourself. This moment shows the induction into the order of deacons as well as the spiritual truth that we do not call ourselves but God calls us and gives us our role.


