Basics of Catholicism part 23

Redemption and Salvation

The first three theories that I covered in the last two parts are the most commonly used theories for Jesus' role in our salvation and the necessity of his death on the Cross. Although ransom, satisfaction, and appeasing an angry God better describe the actions of Jesus, these next two theories are believed by a few.

Before we venture into these last two theories, I want to expand upon a common theological threat they all share: was it necessary that Adam sinned? Both the Recapitulation theory and the Embracement theory state that Adam's sin was not necessary for Jesus to come into the world. Namely, God didn't react to Adam's sin but instead already planned for Jesus to come into the world. We often think that God sending his Son to die on the Cross was the result of Adam's sin and the sin of the world. In contrast, God already planned from the beginning to send his Son into the world for its salvation. Hence, the following two theories follow this logic and explain Jesus' death on the Cross as not a reaction to Adam's sin.

Theory 4: The Recapitulation Theory

God from the beginning desired that all things return to God. The entire world was created to glorify God and one day be restored in him. Jesus' coming into the world was the result of God's desire to bring everything into himself. By Jesus taking on human flesh he became one of the creatures created by God. By being like the creatures that God created, he formed a link between God and the world allowing for everything to be redeemed and brought into the life of God through him. Thus God sending his son into the world was so that all things may be brought into his Son and then brought into him. Jesus' suffering and death on the Cross was the result of the pain of fallen humanity that needed extra work and even death to realize the effects of sin and God's desire for our healing.

No part of this theory is wrong but it is incomplete. Yes, God wants all things to be restored in him and he wants to bring all creation into his life. He made this desire known from the beginning. Yet, this theory ignores the gravity and complexity of sin and the effects of Adam's sin on the universe. We cannot ignore these effects nor think of them as inconsequential in the grand scheme of Salvation History. Any theory that correctly addresses the reason for Jesus coming into the world, enduring his Passion, dying on the Cross, and rising from the dead must hold any theory regarding our redemption from sin and God's desire for the world together as one.

success of the campaign. Fr. Cody will be calling everyone and setting up meeting to discuss this campaign and hear your desires for our parish.






40 Days for Life Spring Kick Off Rallies Tuesday, February 13, 2024
