### Catholic Basics part 15

Jesus

We often forget some of the basics about Jesus. Jesus was a man of the 1st century who was born to a virgin and lived a human life. Although he is human, he is also God. His early life is obscured in history with only a few accounts of his life remaining. At around the age of 30 he began a mission of preaching the message that God wants to reconcile the world and free everyone from their sins. This proclamation received mixed reviews. Some openly accepted it and followed him. Most were ambivalent to the message. A select group, the Pharisees and Sadducees, the leaders of the Jewish people, openly opposed him. During his mission, he healed many who were sick, cast out demons, performed miracles, and made a point that he had fulfilled the prophesies of the Messiah as predicated by the prophets of the Old Testament. After three years of preaching, the Jewish leaders condemned him for blasphemy, tried him using the Roman legal system, and sentenced him to death by crucifixion. After three days in the tomb, he rose from the dead and continued to preach the message and encouraged his disciples and apostles to continue to preach the message of repentance.

Although the above details are probably not new to most of us, I find value in repeating the basics. Part of the joy of returning to basics is that we can see things from a new or different perspective. Often we are so used to the life and ministry of Jesus that we don't think about it anymore. On this point I encourage you to spend some time pondering the basic life of Jesus. What was his early life like? We often fall into two camps when imagining the life of Jesus. Either we divinize him and make him perfect in every way and unrelatable or we humanize him and make him just like us removing his divinity. We must assume that during his early life he knew that he is God but didn't act out of that knowledge. Jesus wanted to experience everything we experience as humans so that through his experience of humanity our human experience can become avenues to encounter and know God. The value of reflecting on Jesus' life is to realize that those basic human experiences are now avenues through which we encounter God. How did the people react to God on earth? The answer is simple, and will be the focus of the next part, they didn't. Jesus didn't show his divinity until after he had begun his mission. Thus his neighbors and family members simply saw a man. Imagine living and working with God-become-flesh and not realizing it. What else do we miss in the world because we assume a certain view of the world?




FUNDING THE MINISTRY OF THE DIOCESE OF HELENA
