Answering the challenges to Pro-life stances part 2

Abortion and Adoption

The most common solution given to those who are claiming that we have another solution besides abortion will give adoption as an answer. Adoption is a decent answer. It favors the life of the child over its death, provides a sense of hope that the child could have a good upbringing, and values the dignity of life. However much we want to use this argument to support our pro-life claims, I want to shed some light on the reality of adoption.

Some adoption agencies work to provide good, loving homes to these children. They screen prospective parents, provide programs to assist the adoption process, and work for the well-being of the child. These agencies also strive to provide excellent care to the children in their care while these children await adoption. Other agencies showcase the horrors we can inflict on children. Some agencies realize that they can make money running an adoption agency. Each child provides them with money so they reduce the care for the children to a minimum, discourage adoption, and strive to make as much money as possible. If you think these agencies don't exist in our state, think again. I know of a few. These agencies harm our claim that adoption is a better option. Their disregard for the well-being of the children under their care supports the abortion activists claims that death is better than these children's quality of life.

Adoption is more than a care-facility where children are housed until adopted. How many people have adopted children? How many pro-life activists are willing to tell a mom to put her child up for adoption but unwilling to adopt a child? Let me be frank. Adoption is incredibly challenging. Any parent who is willing to adopt a child must go through an intensive screening process following by lots of paperwork and legal challenges. Once they have overcome these hurdles, adopted children tend to have higher levels of mental, emotional, and spiritual needs compared to other children. Most foster parents do not have the skills nor provided with ways to gain these skills to work with these challenges. Although adoption can be a beautiful and life-giving experience for a child, it can also be an incredible challenge. We need to be real about this process and its challenges.

I write this column to challenge you. If we are going to stand on the pro-life claim that adoption is better than abortion, which it is, we also need to support adoption clinics, encourage adoption, and support parents who are willing to adopt children. Similarly, we cannot stand on the conclusion that adoption is better than abortion and then wash our hands of the issue. If we are going to make this claim, then we also need to support the claim through our actions. I challenge you to revisit our pro-life claims and find a way that you can further support human life in all its aspects. We are not political activists seeking a moral change. We are people of faith who strive to live the example of the beauty and dignity of all human life.

Montana's Catholic Bishops on the Passage of Constitutional Initiative 128

Dear People of God,

Today marks a significant and tragic setback for babies, women, and parents in Montana. We grieve the passage of Constitutional Initiative 128 (CI-128), which negates existing safeguards for minors and limitations on late-term abortion in our state. We believe many voters approved this measure without fully understanding the heightened risks it brings to minors, parental rights, and babies that are viable outside the womb. However, we remain hopeful. By continuing to share the truth about each person's intrinsic dignity, we envision a future where measures like CI-128 are no longer misrepresented as women's healthcare, and where abortion itself is not misleadingly regarded as a fundamental right.

As Catholics, we hold that every person is created in the image of God and possesses an inherent dignity that is neither self-derived nor replaceable. Each one of us is a unique masterpiece of God's creation. We recognize that the right to life is foundational, the fundamental right upon which all other rights rely. Life deserves the utmost respect from conception to natural death. In honoring the dignity of each person, we strive to build a just society that cares for the most vulnerable, including women who need our support and unborn children who cannot speak for themselves.

Catholics throughout Montana remain committed to assisting and advocating for women in need. Regardless of background, beliefs, or life circumstances, women will find compassion, guidance, and pathways to a hopeful future through any Catholic church in our state.

As we work toward a more just society and embody compassion and charity for others, Catholics are encouraged to support the growing programs and ministries of Catholic Social Services of Montana. 



Did you know?

Cologne Cathedral in Cologne Germany is managed by 12 canon priests, priests who live in community and take care of the church. Since the 8th century, these canon priests are allowed to select their own bishop. The pope sends them three candidates of his approval and then they select on of those candidates as the next bishop. This is one of the few places in the world where the authority to select a bishop is outside the Vatican. This authority was given during the time of the Holy Roman Emperor who was crowned in Cologne and the city was given special prestige due to this status.
