Basics of Catholicism part 37

The Easter Season

The liturgical color for the Easter Season is white. White symbolizes light, resurrection, purity, and new life. The Season of Easter is similar to the other major seasons of the year in that each day has its own character and prayers. The major change in comparison to the other seasons is that the 1st reading is from the Acts of the Apostles for Sunday Masses. The Easter Season is the only time of year in which the 1st reading for Mass is from the New Testament. Even for funerals and weddings during the Easter Season we are required to pick a New Testament reading for the 1st reading. After fasting from the Gloria and Alleluia for 40 days, they are back with greater emphasis and joy. Unlike the Season of Lent, we can celebrate the memorials of the saints.

The Season of Easter has four major events that mark the Season: Easter Sunday, Divine Mercy Sunday, the Ascension of Jesus, and Pentecost.

The most obvious of the days of Season is Easter Sunday, the day of the Resurrection. According to the Gospels, Jesus rose early in the morning before the sun had risen on Easter Sunday, the 1st day of the week. Easter Sunday has some specific parts to mark the importance of that day. The Creed can be replaced with the renewal of Baptismal Promises. Each person at Mass renews their baptismal promises as a way of celebrating the new life and renewing the promises they made at baptism. The Easter Sequence is sung after the 2nd reading to illustrate the major events connected with Easter. If Eucharistic Prayer I is used, then the prayers change to reflect the importance of baptism and the newly baptized from the Easter Vigil.

Divine Mercy Sunday: The 2nd Sunday after Easter, or the following Sunday, was originally called Whit Sunday. On this Sunday, those who were newly baptized at Easter removed their white baptismal garments for the first time and entered the life of the community. Following the reforms under St. Pope John Paul II, he renamed the Sunday as Divine Mercy Sunday connecting the events of Easter to the outpouring of God's mercy. This day is the final day to sing the Easter Sequence and the sung final sending at Mass.

The days between Easter Sunday and Divine Mercy Sunday are called the octave of Easter. These eight days are the highest days of the year and treated with the same gravity and dignity as Easter. The Easter Sequence is sung, the Gloria is sung, the parts of the Mass reflect Easter Sunday, and no other feast day can be celebrated during these days. Even if other feasts like The Annunciation or the Solemnity of St. Joseph fall during these days, the Solemnity is moved to the following Monday, outside the octave of Easter.

Every 4th Saturday of the month, we will have Adoration and Confessions from 9 am to noon. This is a great opportunity to spend some time with Jesus who is present in bodily form in the Eucharist as well as celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation. You are welcome to come for as little or as much time as you wish. Resources will be available to help you pray and make the most of the time you have. I encourage everyone to come and use this opportunity.

The application process for the evangelization grant through the Diocese is open. If you have an idea of how to spread the message of Jesus to our community through our church, please give your ideas to Fr. Cody. I would like us to apply for this grant again this year.
