#### Christian Burial: Notice should be made with the priest before arrangements are made with the funeral director.



#### Morality part 67

#### Social Ethics

The final part of this morality series focuses on social ethics. Social ethics includes everything from the way we behave towards people in society to the ideals and values a society holds. Unlike the other ethics topics that I included in this series, social ethics poses greater challenges. On one level social ethics is less about morality and more situational. For example, racial issues and workers rights. Racial issues largely involve the way we treat each other. Moral issues regarding race involve murder, molestation, and degrading the human person. Workers rights are based on issues of treating workers fairly and the good that workers bring to society. Moral issues regarding workers involve stealing, cheating, molestation, and legal practices. These two examples show some of the interplay between ethicality and morality in social issues.

Another main challenge with social ethics is the vast number of issues that could be part of this series. Everything from child care to elder care, education and the dignity of the human person, collective and individual rights. The vast number of social issues and the interplay between these issues causes great challenges for social ethics. Such as education and race or workers rights and family care.

On a final point I want to emphasize the challenge with the seemingly ephemeral natural of social ethics. Many people believe that social ethics is largely determined by the social situation of the culture or world. Those who adhere to this idea understand social ethics as a evolving process that determines how we should act in a given culture for a given time. The Catholic Church has never held this relativistic understanding of ethics. The best example of the eternal quality of social ethics is the 10 Commandments. These commandments are common throughout the majority of cultures and hold to both reason as well as common sense. We must understand that the process of determining right action for a culture has practical elements for that culture but should hold for all cultures, times, and places. A good example of this concept is racial injustice. When the Spanish settlers arrived in the Americas, their first reaction to the natives was that they are not human. After dealing with the natives for several decades, the Catholic priests of the Mexico area appealed to Rome to stop the injustice done to the natives by the Spanish settlers. Rome responded by affirming their dignity as human beings. Imagine if this idea held for all the historical moments of racial injustice. The world would be a different place if we all agreed on the basic nature of humanity. This is social ethics at its pinnacle: we realize the commonness of our humanity and work for the good for all people regardless of cultural or social situation.

If we get them, I will let you know. The goal is to keep working at raising money until we have enough to complete both parts of the project. 


In celebration of the Sunday of the Word of God, USCCB is
