Basics of Catholicism part 81

General Absolution

The Rite of Penance gives two options for absolving penitents of their sins: individual confessions and general absolution. The most common form, and the one expected by the Church, is individual confessions. Individual confessions are when a person comes to a priest, confesses their sins, receives absolution, and then continues on with their lives. This is the most common form of experiencing this Sacrament. The Church allows for one more option with very specific restrictions around it: general absolution.

General Absolution is when a priest says the Prayer of Absolution with a group of people present. Those who are present do not confess their sins out loud, there could be a communal Act of Contrition, and the priest doesn't provide council, advice, or a penance. For a few decades, this form of the Rite of Penance was widely used during Penance Services as a quicker way of celebrating the Sacrament. The Rite of Penance states that this form can be used if there is a large number of penitents and the amount of time needed to hear their confessions causes an undue hardship on the people or they are in danger of death.

We need to remember that the Sacrament of Reconciliation is not magic. Let's use an example to illustrate my point. Imagine that I am on a plane. The pilot announces that we are going to crash. This situation represents an example where the people are in danger of death. I, a priest, can use the Rite of General Absolution at this moment to help free people from their sins and hopefully save some people from damnation. Yet, this isn't magic. Each person, although I have said the Prayer of Absolution, still has a choice to make. Will they accept this grace? Do they want to be free from their sins? Will they accept God into their lives? The choice of accepting this gift of forgiveness from God is still a choice. Some people will not accept it and even General Absolution is not useful.

This example illustrates one of the major problems with General Absolution used during a Penance Service. Although the people come, hopefully, with contrite hearts, we cannot be assured of their desire to be forgiven. Some people come with the intention of an easy way out of going to Confession and are not really sorry for their sins. Some assume that they don't need to confess their sins and are therefore deprived of the opportunity to be real with the sins in their lives. General Absolution is meant to be used in very isolated circumstances for this reason. The act of confessing sins is the major part of our conversion, understating our own issues, and responding to God's grace.







Catholic Mental Health Counseling


Pray for our Seminarians
