POP QUIZ:

1. Why do we use the color purple during Advent and Lent?

Advent and Lent are royal seasons so we use a royal color to indicate their dignity and importance. The color purple is also much darker than the other colors that we use showing a subdued or saddened tone to the seasons, hence, they are penitential seasons.

2. Could the liturgical color be purple for any other days of the year?

Yes. On penitential days or days that we want to express sorrow or a need for God's mercy the color for the day can be purple. Some of the common days include, funeral Masses, on the anniversary of Roe vs. Wade, on ember days, and other days that focus on a need for God's mercy.

3. What days of the Season of Lent do we sing the Gloria?

This question is a little complicated. The only days that we would sing the Gloria during Lent are any Feasts or Solemnities that fall within the Season of Lent. Normally the Solemnity of St. Joseph and the Annunciation fall during Lent. This year only the Solemnity of St. Joseph is during Lent. Solemnities and Feasts always trump the fasts of the season since they are days of celebration. We are a celebratory people.

Basics of Catholicism part 31

Lent and Holy Week

At this point we have almost finished the Season of Lent. As Lent comes to a close, I want to point out a few details you may have missed and guide you into the final week of Lent called Holy Week. Throughout the Season of Lent the church is quite bare. The goal of the season is to simply our lives and our churches need to reflect this simplicity. Some people have gone the route of adding sand to the holy water fonts or decorating the churches with dead branches. Both of these ideas ignore the primary focus of the season which is simplicity. Holy Water is still valuable and an important part of our devotional life. We don't want to remove those things that are still valuable for our experience of faith and guide us into the experience of the mysteries we celebrate in our churches. Likewise, the focus of each Mass, even funerals for the dead, is about life and the celebration of the life that Jesus has given us. When we decorate with dead plants or symbols of death, we focus our celebrations on death and not the new life that Jesus gave us through his death. Similarly, during Lent, which doesn't apply to most of our churches, instrumental music without singing is forbidden. The church requires either singing or silence during the Season of Lent and the instruments are meant to only support the singing.

Most people don't experience this part of the Lenten Season to its fullest. Each Mass, this includes the Sunday and the daily Masses, ends with a solemn blessing. The solemn blessing can take two forms. Either the extended form that has three parts to the blessing or the simple form that has one part following by the standard blessing that concludes the Mass. These blessings are not optional on Sunday. Once we transition to Easter, I will keep the Solemn Blessing on Sundays but none are required for Sundays or suggested for the weekday Masses.

Holy Week is the most important and privileged week of the year. The purpose of Holy Week is to walk through the final events of Jesus' life and experience anew each year these saving events as well as to experience the final events of Jesus' life. The most common experience during Masses is to hear the events of Jesus' life and reflect on them in our imaginations. Holy Week is different. Each of the five major liturgies (one is not a Mass) is meant to be more experiential than the rest of the year. Palm Sunday has palm branches and the procession of the people into the church. The Mass of the Lord's Supper has the washing of the disciples' feet experienced by the 12 who allow their feet to be washed and watched by the rest. The Liturgy of the Lord's Passion illustrates the death of Jesus through the solemn acts by the priest and the reading of the Passion of Jesus. Both the Easter Vigil and the Easter Sunday Masses, although less experiential, feel the power of the Resurrection through the return of the Gloria, the Alleluia, the color white, the music, and the feel of new life that is expressed in the Mass.


