The gruesome death of Jesus prompts many questions regarding our salvation. Often I heard questions like, why did Jesus have to die? Why did he have to suffer the way he did? Was it necessary that Jesus suffered so that we can be saved? These questions, and some answers to them, caused rifts within Christianity and pose immense challenges for understanding our salvation.

Before I can begin to address the theories regarding Jesus’ actions to bring us salvation, we must understand the nature of sin, its effects on our world, and its relationship to God and his actions. Sin is any deviation from God’s laws. These deviations lead to the loss of God’s presence in the world, a turning inward on ourselves, and a destruction to the goodness of the world. The best example for the effects of sin are Adam and Eve when they were kicked out of the Garden of Eden. We can easily read this passage as though God was punishing Adam and Eve. If you were to read the text carefully, however, you would notice that God is not pronouncing a punishment over them but telling them the effects of their sin. Sin caused God to be angry. We often picture God’s anger as the vengeful, wrathful side from the Old Testament. This “anger of God” is a just anger to the destruction of his world and the loss of his presence and the goodness of the world. God has every right to be angry over the decline of his good and perfect world. Although he could stop the sin by destroying the world as we have seen in Noah’s Flood and the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah, God’s plan is something much stranger, the death of his Son. So, why is this the best plan and why did his Son have to die to end the cycle of sin and death?

Theory 1: Jesus placated an angry God.

God is angry over our continued sinful behaviors. All righteous acts need a solution or a way to right the wrongs that have been commitment, especially with an all just God. Thus God’s vengeful anger for the destruction caused by sin should kill everyone and destroy the world. Instead of God destroying the world and causing an end to sin, Jesus stepped in the way and took the brunt of God’s anger preventing us from having to experience it. Jesus takes on all the pain and suffering of the world and all the effects of sin so that we don’t have to bear the penalty.

If you were following along with my discussion on the nature of the relationship between the Father and the Son, you would quickly realize the problem with this theory. On one level God is angry due to our sins. He didn’t want us to live this way, he wanted us to choose him, and he wanted us to comply with his will. He has a right to be angry and just in his condemnations. The issues isn’t God’s anger but his wrathful anger towards his Son. God cannot fight himself. He cannot be angry towards himself or take out his wrath on himself. The theory challenges the very nature of God and puts God at odds with himself. Therefore, this theory doesn’t work. The anger of God is not abated by the sacrifice of Jesus, his Son.

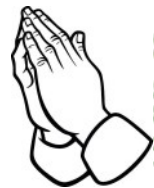
