#### STATEMENT FROM THE UNITED STATES CONFERENCE OF CATHOLIC BISHOPS ON IMMIGRATION

From the Plenary Assembly in Baltimore - November 12, 2025



As pastors, we the bishops of the United States are bound to our people by ties of communion and compassion in Our Lord Jesus Christ. We are disturbed when we see among our people a climate of fear and anxiety around questions of profiling and immigration enforcement. We are saddened by the state of contemporary debate and the vilification of immigrants. We are concerned about the conditions in detention centers and the lack of access to pastoral care. We lament that some immigrants in the United States have arbitrarily lost their legal status. We are troubled by threats against the sanctity of houses of worship and the special nature of hospitals and schools. We are grieved when we meet parents who fear being detained when taking their children to school and when we try to console family members who have already been separated from their loved ones.

Despite obstacles and prejudices, generations of immigrants have made enormous contributions to the well-being of our nation. We as Catholic bishops love our country and pray for its peace and prosperity. For this very reason, we feel compelled now in this environment to raise our voices in defense of God-given human dignity.

Catholic teaching exhorts nations to recognize the fundamental dignity of all persons, including immigrants. We bishops advocate for a meaningful reform of our nation's immigration laws and procedures. Human dignity and national security are not in conflict. Both are possible if people of good will work together.

We recognize that nations have a responsibility to regulate their borders and establish a just and orderly immigration system for the sake of the common good. Without such processes, immigrants face the risk of trafficking and other forms of exploitation. Safe and legal pathways serve as an antidote to such risks. The Church's teaching rests on the foundational concern for the human person, as created in the image and likeness of God (Genesis 1:27). As pastors, we look to Sacred Scripture and the example of the Lord Himself, where we find the wisdom of God's compassion. The priority of the Lord, as the Prophets remind us, is for those who are most vulnerable: the widow, the orphan, the poor, and the stranger (Zechariah 7:10). In the Lord Jesus, we see the One who became poor for our sake (2 Corinthians 8:9), we see the Good Samaritan who lifts us from the dust (Luke 10:30–37), and we see the One who is found in the least of these (Matthew 25). The Church's concern for neighbor and our concern here for immigrants is a response to the Lord's command to love as He has loved us (John 13:34).

To our immigrant brothers and sisters, we stand with you in your suffering, since, when one member suffers, all suffer (cf. 1 Corinthians 12:26). You are not alone!

We note with gratitude that so many of our clergy, consecrated religious, and lay faithful already accompany and assist immigrants in meeting their basic human needs. We urge all people of good will to continue and expand such efforts.

We oppose the indiscriminate mass deportation of people. We pray for an end to dehumanizing rhetoric and violence, whether directed at immigrants or at law enforcement. We pray that the Lord may guide the leaders of our nation, and we are grateful for past and present opportunities to dialogue with public and elected officials. In this dialogue, we will continue to advocate for meaningful immigration reform.

As disciples of the Lord, we remain men and women of hope, and hope does not disappoint! (cf. Romans 5:5)

May the mantle of Our Lady of Guadalupe enfold us all in her maternal and loving care and draw us ever closer to the heart of Christ.



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#### Basics of Catholicism part 111

#### All male priesthood

One of the most common criticisms of the Catholic Church today is that the Church doesn't allow women to become priests. Let's pause here for a moment. How many of you know why the Church doesn't allow women to become priests? Think about it for a moment. Often we get answers like, "because it is a patriarchy" or "The Church doesn't value women" or "the Church doesn't want to change or modernize." What do all these criticisms have in common? They assume we know better than the Church and that we are well versed in Jesus' desire for his Church. I want to take the next three parts to explore this question and to give it a great amount of detail so that you can appreciate this rather challenging yet beautiful topic.

Let's start from the beginning with one of the most common criticisms: "if Jesus had been born in a different time, then he would have allowed women to become priests." This criticism assumes many things that are simply not true. Jesus lived in a time in which women priests were more common than they are today. Greek religious culture had specific temples that allowed only women to become priests such as the cult of Demeter and Athena. Jesus would have been at least somewhat familiar with these temples since they were part of Roman culture as well. Additionally, Jesus is God. I am always amazed by how many people forget that fundamental truth. Why would Jesus be concerned about the public's view of his choices? At no point in Scripture does he seem to care either what the religious leaders think nor the Roman government thinks; Jesus does whatever he deems right and best.

Expanding our view one step further, let's look at Jesus' earliest disciples. Often we focus only on the 12 Apostles. Yet, many women followed Jesus. These women were instrumental in the success of his ministry. They would collect money, take alms, care for his needs, and were with him almost every step of the way. The women were the only people who were present for his passion, death, and Resurrection. The disciples, except John, fled during his passion. John stayed with him for his death but not his Resurrection. Only the women were there for all of it. Additionally, the women got the answers right and understood the nature of Jesus well before the disciples did. In summary, the women were better disciples than the men and, functionally, would have made better priests. The prime example being Mary, who should have been the best example of a priest.

With all this in mind we should be shocked that Jesus didn't choose women to be priests. They were faithful disciples, experienced his passion, death, and Resurrection, and remained with him. Given the cultural experience of the Greeks and Romans, women priests were common. So now we are left with a more puzzling question: Why did Jesus choose only men for the priesthood? Why did the early church hold to and assume than only men could be priests? Why can't the Church change her stance on only men becoming priests today? The answer is soon to come.




# Congratulations!
