Morality part 61

Sexual Morality

Contraception part 1

The morality of contraception requires two parts to fully explain and address many of the standard concerns. This, the first part, will focus on the morality of contraception, whereas the second part will focus on common objections to the Church's stance on contraception and the Church's response. Out of all the moral teachings of the Church, contraception is the most controversial. When St. Pope Paul VI wrote his groundbreaking encyclical *Humane Vitae* in 1968, the world was in uproar. Due to such backlash against his encyclical, he never wrote another encyclical during the rest of his pontificate.

Contraception is the use of a chemical or physical barrier with the intention of preventing pregnancies. Common uses include birth control, chemical barrier, and condoms. Other forms, which are considered contraception, include vasectomies and hysterectomies. I want to emphasize two parts of this definition: a non-natural form of preventing pregnancies and the intention of preventing pregnancies.

The Church declares that any form of contraception used for the purpose of preventing pregnancies is immoral. As I mentioned in previous parts of the morality series, marriage has two ends: the good of the spouses and the procreation of children. If one of those ends is intentionally eliminated from the good of marriage, then the ends of marriage cannot be met causing harm to the marriage. Contraception separates the act of sex within marriage from its end which is children. Therefore the spouses cannot live their marriage vows with the same vivacity since they are separating themselves from the good that the marriage intends.

St. Pope Paul VI emphasized the social challenge that contraception imposes of the good of the social order. When the use of contraception becomes widespread and normal, then unhindered sex will dominant relationships. Basically, the unmitigated use of contraception leads to increased sexual activity and leads people to think of sex as mundane or recreative. Sex, then, loses its unitive function as well as becomes separated from the life-giving nature of sex.

The Church's stance that contraception is immoral maintains the dignity of sex and requires all people to reflect on the nature of sex and its social and relational effects.


