

We have a new Pope!

On Thursday, May 8th, Cardinal Robert Prevost, was elected the 267th pope of Catholic Church taking the name Pope Leo XIV. Since this is a major moment for the church and for the American Catholic Church, I thought that I would take some time to inform you about his life. Pope Leo XIV was born in Chicago, Illinois making him, in one sense, an American Pope. From a young age he desired to be a priest and would "play Mass" with his siblings. He attended a local Augustinian high school which was a pre-seminary program preparing men for later admission into a major seminary. Since a college degree was required for major seminary, he attended Villanova University and earned a degree in Mathematics.

Following his degree, he entered the Augustinian Order. The Augustinian Order was founded in 1244 when a group of Italian hermits grouped together and petitioned Pope Innocent IV to allowed them to live a common life. They adopted the rule of St. Augustine, from the 4th century, and lived a common life of prayer and pastoral work. This group developed into a group focused on the promotion of the Gospel, pastoral ministry, and contemplative prayer. The crest of Pope Leo XIV bears the images associated with the Augustinian Order. The book represents the Book of the Gospel through which the Order derives its emphasis for preaching. The pierced heart harkens to the words of St. Augustine: "my heart is restless until it rests in you." Thus, Pope Leo incorporated these symbols, the symbols of his order, into his papal crest.

Shortly after his ordination to the priesthood, then Fr. Prevost, was sent to the mission in Peru. He spent the next three years in the Peruvian mission staffed by the Augustinian Order before he was sent back to Chicago to help with promotion of vocations. After two years back in the states, he was sent back to Peru and would spend the next 35 years ministering to the people in Peru. He was known for his political activism against the president of Peru who was known for corruption and lack of care for his people. A stanch supporter of human rights, he would often travel on horseback to isolated communities or preach about the violence and oppression of the peoples.

His leadership qualities did not go unnoticed. In 2001 he was named the Prior General of the Augustinian Order, the highest ranking official of the order. After serving 2 6-year terms as Prior General, Pope Francis named him the Apostolic Administrator of the Diocese of Chiclayo in Peru. His promotions didn't stop there. In 2014 he was name Apostolic Nuncio, the pope's delegate to Peru, bishop in 2015, and a member of the Congregation for Bishops in Rome in 2020. Pope Francis made him a cardinal in 2023. The Church named him pope in 2025.

Pope Leo took his name from one of the great popes of the 19th century, Pope Leo XIII. Pope Leo XIII was known for his visionary sense of the world, his grasp of the modern issues and their implications, and a strong sense of social justice. These qualities mark the desires of Pope Leo XIV as he sees issues of technology, human rights violations, the degradation of human dignity, and the loss of a spiritual sense of the world as some of the serious issues of our times. His strong desire for unity and ability to bring disparate groups together are some of the qualities that the Cardinals desired in the next pope.

Please continue to pray for his as he takes the mantle of St. Peter and leads the church. Many people will try to predict or criticize him for his past or current actions. We, as the people of the Church, should listen attentively to his words as our spiritual father leads and guides us.
