Did You Know!

The color purple with signifies the Season's of Lent and Advent was a very expensive color. The color purple was made from harvesting a specific type of sea snail. The glands from 1000's of snails were extracted. dried, crushed into powder, and then made into a dye. Since this process is incredibly labor intensive and difficult to make, only the rich could afford dyes of this color. Thus the color purple was associated with royalty giving the Seasons of Advent and Lent a royal character. A group of Italians are trying to recreate the process of creating this dye. 

Basics of Catholicism part 27:

The Liturgical Year

Our church year, called the Liturgical Year, has many different parts to it. The year is divided into cycles, seasons, and days.

Cycles: Each year has a specific set of readings that follow a three-year cycle. The first cycle is called "Cycle A." On a cycle A year we read from the Gospel of Matthew. Last year was cycle A. The second cycle is called "Cycle B," On a cycle B year we read from the Gospel of Mark with some parts from the Gospel of John. Cycle B years are always on years divisible by 3. The third cycle is called "Cycle C." On a cycle C year we read from the Gospel of Luke. Next year will be a cycle C year. Throughout the course of three years, we will read all four Gospels in their entirety. The new cycle for a year always begins the 1st Sunday of Advent and ends on the Solemnity of Christ the King.

The cycles above are for Sunday readings. The weekday readings, or the readings for weekday Mass, follow a two-year cycle. These cycles are named "Cycle I" and Cycle II." They have no specific characteristics that designate one cycle from another. Cycle II tends to have more readings from the Old Testament than Cycle I. Even years are Cycle II and odd years are Cycle I. The weekday cycle of readings read continuously through a Gospel and complete the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke in a year. The first reading for daily readings will read continuously through a book of the Bible.

Seasons: the liturgical year contains 6 seasons. The Season of Advent prepares us for the Christmas season by reflecting on the prophesies that led to the Messiah. The Season of Christmas celebrates the coming of the Messiah. The Season of Lent is our preparation for Easter and a time of renewal and simplicity. The Sacred Triduum is only three days long and encompasses the time from Holy Thursday until Easter. The Season of Easter celebrates Jesus' Resurrection and the new life that came from him. The Season of Ordinary Time encompasses the rest of the year. During Ordinary Time we walk through the life of Jesus and explore his ministry, teachings, and miracles as they help understand the new life that came through Jesus and instruct us on our lives of faith.

Days: each day of the year has its own designation. Some days are very important and are called Solemnities. On other days we celebrate important events in Jesus' life or the Church called Feast Days. On other days we celebrate the lives of the saints and other important events called Memorials. Some days are part of important seasons of the year and are called Seasonal Days. The lowest days of the year are called ferial days. Feria was the word used to describe a feast day which later became the way to describe a day of the week, i.e. Feria Monday. Any day without a specific feast or celebration is called a ferial day. These are only in Ordinary Time.




