POP OUIZ:

1. Why do we use the color purple during Advent and Lent?

Advent and Lent are royal seasons so we use a royal color to indicate their dignity and importance. The color purple is also much darker than the other colors that we use showing a subdued or saddened tone to the seasons, hence, they are penitential seasons.

2. Could the liturgical color be purple for any other days of the year?

Yes. On penitential days or days that we want to express sorrow or a need for God's mercy the color for the day can be purple. Some of the common days include, funeral Masses, on the anniversary of Roe vs. Wade, on ember days, and other days that focus on a need for God's mercy.

3. What days of the Season of Lent do we sing the Gloria?

This question is a little complicated. The only days that we would sing the Gloria during Lent are any Feasts or Solemnities that fall within the Season of Lent. Normally the Solemnity of St. Joseph and the Annunciation fall during Lent. This year only the Solemnity of St. Joseph is during Lent. Solemnities and Feasts always trump the fasts of the season since they are days of celebration. We are a celebratory people.



Basics of Catholicism part 30

Feast Days and Privileged Seasons

The days of the year fall into five different categories that indicate to us their level of importance.

Solemnities: the highest days of the year are called solemnities. These days include Christmas (12/25), Easter (date depends on the year), the octaves of Christmas and Easter, Annunciation (3/25), the Assumption of Mary (8/15), St. Joseph (3/19), St. John the Baptist (6/24), Sts. Peter and Paul (6/29), All Saints Day (11/1), the Immaculate Conception of Mary (12/8), and every Sunday of the year. These days are the most critical for understanding our salvation and God's action. Therefore the Church requires you to celebrate these days and participate in Mass unless they are on Mondays or Saturdays. The color for Solemnities is always white.

Feasts: lesser in importance than solemnities are feasts. Feasts are important events in the life of the Church but not the most central for understanding our faith. Some of the feast days include, the Feast of the Archangels (9/29), the Feast of the Chair of St. Peter (2/22), the Conversion of St. Paul (1/25), most of the Apostles of the Church, the Transfiguration of Jesus (8/6), and some others. If the person celebrated was a martyr, the color is red. If the person was not a martyr, the color is white.

Memorials: the next level below Feasts is memorials. Memorials are celebrations of saints or other important aspects of our faith that have lesser importance than feasts. Memorials can either be obligatory, meaning we have to celebrate it, or optional, which means I can choose between a few different options for saints or not celebrate the saint on that day. Some memorials are optional because they are only important in certain parts of the world. For instance the memorial of St. Kateri Tekakwitha or St. Andre Bessette are more important for the Americas than any other country. The color for martyrs is red and the color for everyone else is white.

Seasonal days: in between memorials and the ordinary days of the year are seasonal days. Seasonal days are the days of a privileged season like the days of Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter that don't already have a saint, feast, or another important event celebrated on that day. Seasonal days are more important than ordinary days and sometimes more important that memorials. During the Season of Lent, all memorials are suppressed for the sake of the Season of Lent. During Advent, Christmas, and Easter most memorials become optional.

Ferial Days: the word "ferial" comes from the Latin word for "feast." Thus even the most ordinary days of the year are still a cause for celebration. Ferial days only occur during the Season of Ordinary Time. On ferial days, the Church gives the priest the option to choose the ordinary day of the year or a votive Mass. Votive Masses are special Masses celebrated for a cause dependent on the desires of the community, i.e. perseveration of peace and justice, a saint, civil needs, good weather, and many more.


