

#### Basics of Catholicism part 52

#### Confirmation

Although we don't often celebrate the Sacraments in this order, the Sacrament of Confirmation is the second Sacrament of the Sacraments of Initiation. Confirmation is also one of the most misunderstood of the Sacraments. For this reason, I am going to slowly walk through the basics of Confirmation to give it its due weight.

The history of the Sacrament of Confirmation is one of the most complicated of all the Sacraments. In the early Church most people entered the Church as adults. As adults, the process is very different from the process for children. When an adult is baptized, they are confirmed as part of the initiation rites of the Church. We maintain this structure at the baptisms at the Easter Vigil. First the person confesses their faith in God and the Church. Then the person is plunged in the water completing the Sacrament of Baptism. After they have been baptized, the next part is to be sealed with those graces using the Sacred Oils in the Sacrament of Confirmation. The final step of initiation is to receive the Eucharist.

For three centuries this was the process for initiating a new member into the Church. After Christianity became legal under the Edict of Constantine in 313, the number of people who wanted to enter the Church exploded. More people desired baptism and entrance into the Church than the Church could handle. Thus, the amount of time to prepare a person was reduced to 4 months and the standard Sacrament for initiation was baptism. The Sacrament of Confirmation has always been considered the Sacrament of the Holy Spirit. The bishop is the principal sign of the Holy Spirit since he is a successor of the Apostles. Therefore, even though baptism was given to priests, the Sacrament of Confirmation remained with the bishops. As the number of youth and converts grew, the bishops simply couldn't be present for each baptism. Therefore, the Sacrament of Confirmation moved away from the moment of baptism and was received at a later age.

By the Middle Ages, the Sacrament of Confirmation was connected with the age of reason. At one point this age was 10 and then Pope Pius X moved it to 7. Pope Pius X was so amazed by the faith of a young girl, that he changed the age of reason to 7 to accommodate those children who wanted to receive the Sacraments earlier. Thus the age of Confirmation became 7 years old. Only in the last 50 years the church, mostly in America and Europe, moved the Sacrament of Confirmation to high school age. The prevailing thought was that high schoolers were more mature and able to make a decision about choosing their faith than a 7 year old. Thus, the Sacrament of Confirmation was connected with choice, graduation, and completion of a Catholic education. Soon you will realize the tragedy that fell upon the Sacrament of Confirmation because of this change.




