

Basics of Catholicism part 24

Redemption and Salvation

In the previous part we begun to explore other theories of our salvation and redemption in Jesus that were not consequences of Adam's sin and the fall.

Theory 5: Embracement theory

Jesus' coming into the world was an expression of God's love for the world. God, the author and fullness of love, wanted to embrace the world, he wanted to be in it and a part of it. He wanted to be so close to the world as to be able to touch and hold it. Yet, the world would not understand God's love for it unless it both had the choice to choose against it and chose against God's will. Thus God created a world in which the world would choose against God and feel the effects of the separation. Jesus coming into the world created a sharp contrast between the fallenness of the world and the joy of God coming to be with his creation. Thus God embraced the world through his coming to visit the fallen world and show his love by redeeming it.

The Embracement theory has many problems. The first, and most glaring problem, is that God didn't give his creatures free-will but only the semblance of it. The world was supposed to fall into sin; God made it fall into sin so that he could show it his love. The other way to look at this problem is that the world needed to be fallen in order to experience God's love. The second problem is that the experience of God's love necessitates sin. Heaven is the prime counter example. Those in Heaven experience God's love without sinning. Only in our temporal world does sin become a means through which we can experience God's mercy. Sin is not the only avenue to experience God's mercy. God can show his mercy to whomever he wants.

Theory 6: The Scapegoat Theory

This last theory of our salvation and redemption is not a theory but a fulfill-ment of Scripture. In the Book of Exodus when the ritual of atonement begun, the High Priest would take two goats. One of the goats was sacrificed as an appeal to God for the forgiveness of sins. The priest put his hands on the second goat symbolically giving it all the sins of the Israelites to the goat. Then the High Priest would drive the goat out of the camp symbolically driving away the sins of the people into the desert. Jesus is the fulfillment of this ritual. All the sins of the world were placed upon him and he was killed to show the offering of the Son to the Father, the effects of sin, and the sacrifice that brought forgiveness of sin. This theory illustrates the connection between Old Testament ritual and its meaning fulfilled in Jesus. It doesn't explain why Jesus was crucified nor the reason God sent his Son into the world.


Catholicism 101
