Basics of Catholicism part 14

Revelation part 2

Modern society gives revelation a bad feel. Given the ways in which it has been used, I sometimes agree. Often divine relation is used to justify many different types of actions with sometimes devastating consequences. A self-proclaimed prophetess in 2008 convinced many people that she was told by God to begin a project to end all sexual sins starting along the I-8 corridor in Minnesota. A group formed quickly and began to protest and vandalize sex operation like porn shops and prostitute houses. The project lasts around 2 months before all its energy fades and nothing ever became of it. Situations like this one show the challenges with revelation and, more specifically, personal revelations.

Even with the great challenges of people receiving their own revelations and using them for political or cultural gain, divine revelation is a central tenant of Christianity and an incredibly valuable one. Through personal revelation we come to know God, understand his will for our lives, and allow God to be revealed to us and come to know ourselves through him. The church, however, has formed a system for understanding and evaluating the validity of revelation called discernment.

The first principles of discernment focus on the nature of God. Since God is eternal, his will does not change, and he must be true, any revelation must follow from what God has already revealed. God is not going to ask someone to go and believe in another God or start a new religion. He is not going to ask some to murder another person or unjustly treat people. These actions would violate God's laws and make him a fraud. Therefore anything that is received through revelation must match with our understanding of God and his laws.

The second principle for discerning God's revelation is truth. The prophets of the Old Testament are great examples of this concept. If God reveals something to a prophet and the prophesy doesn't come true, the prophet is a false prophet. If someone claims that the end of the world is coming and nothing happens, the person has spoken falsely and their words are not true. In a similar way, we don't have to accept everything that people say that God revealed to them. We have the benefit of time. We can wait until the fulfillment of their words before believing that these ideas were revealed by God. The Church uses this principle to evaluate miracles and apparitions. What did the person who appeared at the apparition say? Is it consistent with the Christian tradition? What happened to the people who heard the message? What were the affects following the apparition? All these questions are necessary so that we can be certain that it was God's will.

Although revelation seems complicated, we should have a sense of confidence that God wants us to know his will and to be able to do it. He remains consistent and has given us this system so that we can figure out his will, listen to him, and have confidence in hearing his voice.






